The youth summer mission trip is quickly approaching! This year, we'll be spending June 17<sup>th</sup>-23<sup>rd</sup> in Tucumcari, NM with Epworth UMC in Arlington, Mooreville UMC, and Lorena UMC. Our living center is just one of many living centers that will be spread across New Mexico, and all told over a thousand students from the Central Texas Conference will be working in mission in New Mexico that week.

I've spent virtually my entire life in and around youth ministry, and one of the few constants that I've observed is that mission trips are always amazing. From living in

community with fellow believers for a week, to powerful worship, to being exposed to different cultures and lifestyles, and spreading the love of Christ, mission trip does it all. The smiling faces and joy in service do more to transform lives than any simple task ever could. The task is just an outlet for that Christian love.

I realized that no matter how much I love them; no matter how much I wanted them to have a faith that means as much to them as mine does to me, at some point, they would have to take that next step for themselves and claim Christ as their Savior. What I have done is pray for them, live my faith, and tell them what I know to be true about Jesus. In doing so, I have tried to give them the same solid foundation in Christ’s Love my parents had given me.

Easter reminds us, we need to encourage each other to take the next step in our journeys of faith. We do this by praying for each other, living our faith and telling each other what we know to be true about Jesus. This is the essence of evangelism whether we are trying to share our faith with children, friends, neighbors, or strangers. Sometimes it is as simple and immediate as Mary’s statement to the disciples, “I have seen the Lord!” or it may be as involved as loving someone to Christ year after year after year.

as an educator and Caleb will continue his education at Perkins School of Theology, SMU.


Thank you all for your continuous fellowship and kindness, and thank you for letting me be a part of you children’s lives! St. John’s will always hold a special place in my heart.

# Stephen Ministry

*There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord.—1 Corinthians 12:5*

The Stephen Ministry brochure proclaims “God’s Love in Action,” but this is not the action of feeding the hungry, repairing homes, or traveling elsewhere on mission work.

Instead, Stephen Ministers offer quiet, consistent, loving care, bolstered by prayer, to those facing difficulties of all sorts. They listen and encourage, trained through a 50-hour program to be fully present. They are committed to regular contact with their care receivers. They engage in ongoing, interdenominational education to remain up-to-date about community resources. They offer a confidential sounding board, free of charge and free from emotional overlay that may exist between the care receiver and his or her family members or friends.

In Stephen Ministry, how long a relationship continues is determined by the care receivers. Some relationships may offer support during a stressful time that is resolved fairly quickly. Other relationships may continue for years because of ongoing problems, health issues, or evolving life events. Whatever the circumstances, Stephen Ministers bring one-on-one Christian care and affirmation that we need never walk alone.

# Sager Brown

During the week of April 8 – 13, I was blessed to be able to go with a team to Sager Brown, the UMCOR depot, located in Baldwin, La. This was our third trip to Sager Brown and the St. John’s team consisted of me, Nikki Underwood, Linda Lindell and Bridget Hancock.

What we did during the week was work on cleaning buckets. It was no surprise since we knew how damaging the hurricanes of 2017 had been. We not only made buckets, but we “verified” buckets. By verifying, I mean that we had to assure that the buckets were made exactly according to the specifications. Unfortunately, there were literally hundreds of buckets that we had to ‘re – do” because the sponges were incorrect. Each kit contains 7 sponges, and there were buckets made with what is known as “cellulose” sponges, which leak, get everything wet, and eventually create mold and mildew. Not a good situation. My job during the week was to stuff in the 7 sponges – it was a hard job! Over the course of the week, we produced 69 pallets of cleaning buckets, or a total of 2484 buckets. From now on the cleaning buckets made in local churches will not contain sponges – it is requested that money be sent to purchase the sponges locally and they will be added on site.

Pastor Darren recently asked us this question “Where are you seeing Christ today?” While you’re at Sager Brown you see Christ in many ways. As you walk the sacred grounds, you can almost hear the laughter of the small orphans who once lived there. As you enter the cafeteria, you can see the children who once went to school there lining up for their noon meal. You can see Christ in the faces of the other volunteers, as they experience the joy that comes when helping others. You can see it in the faces of those in the community who you have served.

So if any of this sounds like something you’d like to be involved in, there’s another trip planned with us next February (10 thru 15) Please see Nikki for more details.
